2014 Robert Estabrook Moeller Memorial Research Award **Recipient Named**

Lacawac Sanctuary and Field Station is pleased to announce that the first recipient of the Robert Estabrook Moeller Memorial Fund Research Fellow Award is Dr. Robyn Smyth of Bard College.

Dr. Smyth will use the \$2,000 award to conduct a new research project on Lake Lacawac and other Pocono region lakes. Her project is focused on understanding how long-term increases in precipitation in northeastern USA are affecting lake water clarity and water temperatures. Changes in clarity and temperature can impact water quality and the amount of suitable habitat for aquatic organisms. Dr. Smyth will begin her project in the summer of 2015.



Dr. Smyth joined the Center for Environmental Policy at Bard College as an Assistant Professor in 2012. Recent projects by Dr. Smyth span the globe from Michigan to China to the Southern Ocean. She is also an adjunct scientist at the Cary Institute of Ecosystem Studies in Millbrook, NY and a member of the Global Lake Ecological Observatory Network (GLEON) which seeks to utilize high frequency sensor data to better understand

and manage lake ecosystems. Dr. Robert E. Moeller, a long-time friend and supporter of Lacawac Sanctuary, passed away in 2011. Robert was a limnologist (lake scientist) who spent many years at Lacawac conducting research on Lake

Lacawac and other nearby Pocono lakes. Robert's interests in limnology were broad and encompassed diverse topics including paleolimnology, aquatic botany, and the ecology of ultraviolet radiation. Throughout his career, Robert was generous in

giving his time to help students and colleagues with their research. Robert's generosity extended to his establishment of an endowed fund which supports promising students and faculty in limnology. 

Application deadline is April 5, 2015. Qualified students will be accepted on a rolling basis until all spaces are filled. Students who complete DESLA and enroll at Drexel will receive a \$2000 renewable scholarship. *Application Requirements:* Applicants will be asked to submit a 250-500 word essay that addresses the following topic: "Why are you interested in Drexel's Environmental Science Leadership Academy and what do you hope to learn/gain by attending the program?" Essay will be required before submitting application. Applicants will also be asked to self-report their PSAT and SAT scores (if applicable), as well as your GPA and Class Rank (if known).

Consortium Partner Spotlight North Branch Land Trust

North Branch Land Trust is a conservation organization focused on helping landowners preserve their property and helping communities develop growth strategies for the benefit of their citizens. Primarily, the Land Trust accomplishes its mission by accepting donations of development or subdivision rights on land, through a legal agreement called a conservation easement. Less frequently, the Land Trust will seek financial resources to purchase development rights on land. The Land Trust is also the receptacle for

gifts of land or other real property. North Branch Land Trust relies almost exclusively on memberships, gifts and grants to accomplish its mission.

Besides working to conserve

critical wildlife habitat, open space, forestlands, viewsheds, and farmland, the Trust also conducts a variety of community outreach events to educate landowners, municipal officials, and key community leaders on the importance of smart growth strategies that reduce sprawl type development and recognize the value of natural lands.

Examples of community outreach events conducted by the Land Trust include but are not limited to: Staff presentations on the socioeconomic benefits of land conservation; Staff and guest lectures on the long term social and economic costs of poorly planned development; Naturalist seminars on regional plant and animal species and the need to protect habitat; Naturalist led hikes to ecologically significant sites; Trust led kayak and boating trips on regional waters; and Membership Committee events to build awareness of the Land Trust's activities and increase the Trust's membership numbers;


Lacawac 2015 Photo Contest
